# Edible schoolyard program may face districtwide cuts

## Failure to find new funds may lead to job loss, discontinuation

The gardening and cooking program in Berkeley elementary schools could be facing cuts if new sources of funding are not found soon, a situation that would affect students and school employees alike.

Edible schoolyards for gardening have been a staple in Berkeley elementary schools for decades, and their purpose is to teach students the values of nutrition and healthy living. But with recent losses in federal funding, Berkeley Unified must now scour its budget to find new fund-



Putting the clues into the grid gives the cluephrase "SYMBOL FOR ASPARAGINE OR LETTER UNDER A TILDE IN SPANISH". In addition, the first letters of the answers spell "ALSO NORTH". Together, these give the final answer, the letter N.

This week's puzzle is called a Sashigane, which translates to Carpenter's Square. The goal of this puzzle is to divide the grid into L-shaped pieces. Each Lshaped piece must be one block wide, but can contain varying numbers of squares. The circles in the grid mean that square is the "bend" in an L-shaped piece. If there is a number in the circle, that tells you how many squares in total are contained in that piece. The arrows mark the ends of pieces. The tail of the arrow is the end of a piece, and the arrow points towards the bend in the piece. An L-shape can have any number of these symbols in it, including zero. When you have solved the puzzle, shade all the pieces containing 5 squares to get the final answer, which will be a single letter.

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
