Election Date Set for Junior Representative

Vote Will Be Held Jan. 29; Nominations Group Will Interview Applicants

Candidates for junior men's representative will be voted upon Tuesday, January 29.

The date was set yesterday by Alden W. Smith, 29 A.B.U.C. president and chairman of the nominations committee. Names of candidates who pass the final decision of the committee Monday, January 21, will be published Tuesday morning.

Smith requests all candidates for the post to see him in his office in Department Union Friday for an interview with the nominating committee. Those passed upon by the committee will present themselves at an A.B.U.C. meeting at 10 a. m. Thursday, January 24, in the Gymnasium for men.

"This method of selecting candidates by nomination committee is to be extended to include candidates running for all A.B.U.C. offices in the future," Smith said. "It insures only the best qualified running for office and will prevent haphazard nominations from the floor which may lead to unsatisfactory elections and procedure which might become unparliamentary."
